



Wedding Planning Form

Step 1:

Print this form and complete your information.

In most weddings, all the men wear the same style coat, pants and shirt. The groom is often differentiated from his attendants by the color of his vest and/or tie. In some cultural traditions, the groom will wear a different color tuxedo or a longer coat in order to stand apart.

When deciding who to include in your tuxedo plans, be sure to consider all of the family members who will be appearing in your wedding pictures.

Step 2: Pick styles

Use the Build-a-Tux feature of our website to create different options for your wedding party and record your favorite styles on your planning form.

Step 3: Visit a store

Bring your notes with you as you visit your Tuxedo Central retailer to set up your account. Register on TuxedoCentral.com to get your groom's tuxedo free!

If a swatch of the brides dress and / or bridesmaids' dresses are available, it is helpful to bring those to your tuxedo consultation.

Step 4: Get measurements

Ask the gentlemen in your wedding to get measured at any formalwear or menswear specialist in their area. They should print the measurement form and bring it with them. They will then fax or call their measurements into your Tuxedo Central retailer at least one month before your wedding so that their orders can be prepared for delivery.

NOTE: these suggestions do NOT apply to weddings of ultra formal, traditional etiquette, where gentlemen wear the cutaway, stroller or white tie and tails. In these cases, all men are attired exactly the same.

| Groom The Groom often wears a white or ivory vest and tie to match the color of the bride's dress and stand apart from the rest of the men. Silver is a common alternate. His accessories are often lighter in color than the rest of the party. | | | |
| Best Man The best man usually looks like all the other groomsmen. | | | |
| Groomsmen The groomsmen typically wear a vest and tie that compliments the color of the bridesmaids' dresses. Sometimes they wear neutral colors (like platinum, antique brass or black). | | | |
| Jr. Groomsmen The Jr. Groomsmen are younger members of the wedding party who look just like Groomsmen. | | | |
| Ushers You should have at least one usher for every 25 - 50 guests. Ushers can wear the same styles as the Groomsmen, or they can wear black accessories. Sometimes Ushers wear a black cummerbund and bow tie. | | | |
| Ring Bearer / Candle Lighter / Bible Bearer The Ringbearer is usually dressed exactly like the Groom. The youngest recommended age for a ring bearer is 3 years. | | | |
| Fathers of the Bride and Groom Typically, both fathers are attired the same, wearing black vests and ties. However, if the Groom's Father is also the Best Man (a southern tradition), then he is dressed as all other groomsmen. If the Bride's Father is not in attendance, the individual 'giving her away' should be listed here. | | | |
| Stepfathers Stepfathers usually wear the same garment as the fathers. | | | |
| Grandfathers Grandfathers usually wear the same garment as the fathers. They should receive special consideration as their age lends them to more classical choices. A bow tie is always appropriate for Grandpa! | | | |
